## FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

#### Is it Spring Yet?

Because I am a man of faith, I believe, with a full and perfect faith, that by the time this article is printed in *The Message*, Spring will finally have sprung. If nothing else, the erratic climate patterns of this seemingly unending winter attest to the fact that the regular patterns and rhythms of nature to which we are accustomed, and upon which we have come to depend, are not always as predictable as we might want them to be. It doesn't mean that the world is coming to an end, though global warming might have something to do with what we have been experiencing... it just means that taking nature and its patterns for granted is not always a safe bet.

Be that as it may, this much I know for sure. Seven weeks from the second night of Passover, Shavuot arrives, and this year

will be no exception. Day by day, for the forty-nine days of the Omer, we have been counting "up" to what was the spiritual counterpart to the Exodus saga. Our miraculous departure from Egyptian slavery accomplished freeing us from bondage; it was a physical redemption that changed everything about the lives of our ancestors. But it was only the beginning of our story...

With all appropriate apologies to a much-loved song from the Haggadah, to have been freed from Egypt and not have received the Torah would not have been enough. Being freed from the physical hardships of slavery was an imperative. We could never, as a nation, realize our destiny as slaves. But while we were physically redeemed, the chronicles of our ancestors make it amply clear that, in terms of the life of the spirit, we were far

indeed from greatness. We needed the revelation of God's will at Sinai to bring us to a greater understanding of what God expected/demanded of us, and how our lives were intended to justify that new-found freedom.

Every year, as we prepare once again to celebrate the anniversary of that Revelation, we ready ourselves by studying Torah, at a Tikkun Leil Shavuot. Following services on Saturday evening, May 19, we'll share a light dinner, and spend a few hours "reveling in the Revelation." I hope you'll join us!

## NOTES FROM THE HAZZAN

This season is all about counting. We have been counting the days, one by one, beginning with the second night of Passover in this period that is known as Sefirat HaOmer. We counted the days to Yom Hazikaron, the day for remembering and memorializing those men and women who fell in defense of

the land of Israel and then to Yom Ha'atzmaut, the day on which we celebrated Israel's 70th birthday. And we are already half way through our counting of days until we reach the holiday of Shavuot, the days that celebrate our receiving of the Torah. On a personal level, I have also been engaged in another type of counting; one that is also of tremendous value and importance.

In November I began teaching a class for congregants who wanted to learn to read Hebrew. I had no idea how many students would sign up for the class but it turns out that the number kept rising until finally there were nine faithful students who spent almost the entire school year studying with me every Tuesday night. I told them that they would learn to read in

seven weeks but I guess I'm not as good at counting as I thought I might be. Our last class will be May 8th, which will mark six months of study! This group has learned how to read and how to take a commitment seriously. I am so proud of each and every one of them, many of whom have even been able to help make the evening minyan before class where they could also be counted and counted upon. We know that it is harder to learn a language the older you get, but this class has proven to me and to themselves that there is no task too difficult to complete if you truly set your mind to it. So the next time a class is offered and you can't decide if you should enroll or not, just stand up and say "Count me in."

## THE PRESIDENT'S PEN

### With Streits Comes Spring?

As I write this article, the sun is shining, trying hard to warm a 40 degree 'spring'

day. When Pesach falls early, as it did this year, it's hard to think of it as our Spring Holiday. New spring garb was not to be seen. This year, we were pleased the snow that fell melted before it had to be shoveled. Dayenu.

In addition to the unseasonable weather, this Pesach had a very different look in my house. It was my first Pesach without Streit's Matzah. Yes, the 'pretty pink box that reminds us of spring' was not to be found. Not that it was not available at our local stores. But the stores were not giving it away, and so, it was an Aviv and Yehuda Pesach in the Altman house. As someone who does not relish change, this was major.

As I am sure it is in many families, what we purchase and what we eat, especially on holidays, invokes memories of holidays past. Pesach also brings out dishes we have not seen in a year, frying pans we meant to replace, and sippy cups and rubber tipped spoons we save at the bottom of the storage crate. We carefully unpack the pink mixing spoon, the one that used to be white, and retell the story of the cherry jello. We prepare chremseles, Matzah pancakes, in my grandmother's Chremsel bowl, carefully washing and rewrapping it after we eat. We take out handkerchief matzah covers decorated with sparkle glue over twenty years ago, afikomen bags sewn together with yarn, along with frogs made of paper plates, and even a baby Moses ready to float down the Nile. Each year, Pesach brings a rush of memories.

Just as we are getting into the flow of our eight day celebration, it is time to think

about packing it up. But not before we gather as a community to recite Yiskor. Yiskor on Passover seems that much sadder and more meaningful. It is the holiday when the empty seats at the table are more noticeable, as we recall which parts of the Haggadah were read by family no longer with us. We can hear their voices and picture them at Seders past. We remember who gulped from Elijah's cup so the youngest returning from the front door would think Elijah stopped by. We think back to singing as a family, though each in a different key, yet it sounded so pleasing.

Yes, it was a fine Pesach with Aviv and Yehuda Matzah, and may be a new tradition. But I cannot stop thinking that the cold, damp holiday would have been just a bit warmer and sunnier if I had picked up five pounds of Streit's!

## Education

### The End of a Journey

At the beginning of my term, we embarked on the process of bringing Pre-K for All to the FHJC Nursery School. While the process was not simple, Pre-K for All allowed us to meet the needs of our community, and at the same time, stay true to our ideals through the Judaic Wrap Around Program. It is fair to say that after almost two years, Pre-K for All at FHJC is a success!

We also created a new parent organization, United Parents, which sought to enrich the Jewish experiences of our children. The Back-to-School Picnic at Cunningham Park, where parents, students and teachers can connect in a casual setting, has become an annual event that our families look forward to. “Pajama Shabbat” and “Dress Your Best” Shabbat were wonderful opportunities for our younger children and their families to sing Shabbat songs with the Rabbi and

Hazzan in a fun and relaxing atmosphere. The Family Shabbat Dinner, which has been so well-received, allows families a chance to experience a traditional Friday night Shabbat service and dinner, in the company of friends. Havdalah Movie and Game Night is a tradition that has continued and become stronger, with help from our Men’s Club and Sisterhood. Families danced with the Torahs and then continued the celebration with ice cream and treats at the Simchat Torah Ice Cream Party. The Challah Bake, which Sisterhood co-sponsored, has been a resounding success, and another one is coming up shortly as I write this.

United Parents also organized various fundraising activities that have often been tied to the Jewish calendar. The Rosh Hashana Honey Sale, the Scholastic Bookfair right before Hanukkah and Miss Chocolate Pass-over Candy Sale all helped provide needed funds that can be used to create engaging activities for the children. We also started a school supplies fundraiser, which provided the convenience of having all the required supplies in the children’s classroom on the first day of school. We cannot forget “Dancing Danny” Pollock, who began an adult Israeli dance series at FHJC, while continuing to work with our Nursery School and Religious School children.

One of the highlights of my time as Education Vice President was the annual Youth Shabbat. It was a joy to watch the children, ranging in age from Nursery School through High School, lead all aspects of the Shabbat morning service. Hazzan Rosenblum prepared our children and teenagers beautifully, and each Youth Shabbat is a reminder of how much our Shul has to be proud of. I want to take this time to thank


